Library Cookbook Club



Learning to Die in Miami presented by Carlos Eire

Tuesday, October 12 at 7pm

Carlos Eire fled to the United States from his homeland of Cuba in 1962, one of 14,000 unaccompanied children sent to Florida to escape Fidel Castro's regime. His book, Waiting for Snow in Havana: Confessions of a Cuban Boy, won the 2003 National Book Award for nonfiction. His memoir, Learning to Die in Miami, chronicles the years he spent away from his family acclimating to a complete



away from his family acclimating to a completely new country, as well as his eventual reunion with his mother. Carlos is a T. Lawrason Riggs Professor of History and Religious Studies at Yale University, where he has been a faculty member since 1996.



by Marie Benedict and Victoria Christopher Murray



CHANGES TO DIGITAL PROGRAMS

Overdrive has announced that the Overdrive App will be removed from the Apple and Google Play Stores in February 2022. New users to Overdrive after that date will have to download and use the Libby app. If you are a current Overdrive App user, you will be encouraged to switch to Libby by the end of 2022. We have also been informed that SimplyE is transitioning to a program called The Palace Project. As of September 3, Lyme patrons can no longer access digital items via the SimplyE app. We will be notified when The Palace Project app is up and running, and we will let you know.
